He detailed the history of his facility which started out as a farm shed and grew to become a wonderful stage, bar and museum which has hosted a number of very famous country music stars and had lots of comical anecdotes to share. We all had fun pointing out and recognising items from our childhood. After a full tour of the shed, we moved onto the Bunkhouse and enjoyed listening to stories about the Centre's beginnings and his favourite songs by Elvis and other artists. Back to the cars for a drive through the rest of the property which hosts

regular weekend Rodeos, music and camping, where we were greeted by more amazing sights, including the statutes of Giant Guitar Men, boot hill and his collection of upsidedown trees.







Back for a quick bite of lunch and then onto Micks Pig Collection. Starting with a large ceramic pig as a gift from his daughters, Mike (a former piggery manager) has managed to put together as assortment of over 3600 pigs over 30 years. The club was welcomed into his home, where we enjoyed viewing his funny and diverse collection.

Next stop The Quacking Frog Teapot Shed, with its collection of teapots. Lovely hosts, Ray and Ruth, shared a bit of their history with us, as we strolled amongst shelves filled with all things tea Members were related. treated to a delicious Devonshire Tea. with yummy scones (jam and cream of course) and tea or coffee.
